

Hawaii Legislature Nears the Midway Point

For any of our readers who have participated in Hawaii's legislative process, you know that it is both fast-paced and full of back-to-back hearings on an amazing variety of proposed legislation. It is exciting and awe-inspiring to witness the creation of laws to improve upon and regulate our society. It is also sometimes disappointing when a piece of legislation that you had hopes for dies in a committee hearing.

It is important for us to remember that all of the laws that have benefited our children with disabilities were enacted by Congress or our State Legislature because there was strong advocacy by families and other stakeholders. So if you have the passion for a particular issue and a little bit of time, it is possible to make your voice heard from your living room.

Two important supports are needed: 1) information on which bills are being heard and what they propose to do, and 2) a working understanding of how to submit testimony.



One resource SPIN finds helpful is the **State Council on Developmental Disabilities**. They are very active each legislative session in following bills affecting our children and adults with disabilities and sending out notices to folks who sign up on their listserv. 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5 Bills Moving through the 2024 Legislature that Impact Children with Disabilities





Increases funding for the reimbursement of applied behavioral analysis services through Med-QUEST.





Provides funding and resources to grow the use of ABLE Savings accounts for children and adults with disabilities.





Requires schools to screen K-3 students to identify and support students who are at risk of dyslexia and other learning disabilities.





Supports the children of military personnel transferring to Hawaii by creating a process for expedited school enrollment.





Expands the option of early learning programs to access space in state properties besides public school campuses.

HAWAII CHILD WELLNESS INCENTIVE PROGRAM (HCWIP)

March 11, 2024 through June 30, 2027



Are you a parent who has Medicaid/QUEST for your health insurance? You'll want to know about this brand new incentive program. It encourages parents to bring their children under 18 years of age in to see the doctor for their well-care examinations.

Parents can receive a \$50 Visa/Mastercard for each child who successfully completes an annual well-child examination.

To apply for this incentive, click on the DHA 1193 HCWIP application form, print out a copy, and take it to your child's doctor when they have their wellness exam.



Many of our kids with disabilities have **eating problems** that may result from medical, behavioral or sensory issues--things that go beyond the shores of being a picky eater. Most parents will benefit from the guidance of our expert presenters on how to support their minnow in developing healthy eating habits by offering choice and avoiding power struggles.

5 Things Parents of Children with Autism Need

to Know About

DROWNING PREVENTION



1. Drowning Rate

The drowning rate for children with Autism is 160 times greater than those without. About half (48%) of these children wander from their parents/adults. As a result, 74% of these wandering children end up drowning.

2. Drawn To the Water

Children with Autism are especially drawn to the water. They love the way is looks, feels and even smells. They like the way it shimmers & flows and even how it feels on their skin.





3. Never Leave Your Child Unattended

Keep constant eyes on your child and never leave them alone assuming they won't jump, slip or slide in attended. A moments inattention can have tragic results.

4. Survival Based Swim Lessons

When choosing a swim program for your child, make sure to sign him/her up for a survival based swim lesson program. This will ensure they have the skills neccessary if they ever reach the water alone.





5. Dangers Of Using Floatation Devices

Floatation devices are used as a precautionary for moving vessels and open water. They should not be used for swimming. They give a false sense of security and put your child at a higher risk for drowning when used incorrectly.



LEARN THE LAYERS OF PROTECTION

Water safety isn't just during swim time. Each layer should be used together when in or around water to help reduce the risk of drowning. You never know which layer will save a life!



BARRIERS & ALARMS:

It's important to use four-sided fencing with self-closing, self-latching gates, pool safety covers, and alarm systems to help prevent children and unauthorized adults from accessing water unsupervised.





SUPERVISION:

Stay vigilant and aware of your surroundings with close, constant, and capable adult supervision from a designated water watcher or lifeguard anytime children are in or around water.





WATER COMPETENCY:

Every child and adult should be equipped with the skills to protect themselves in water by learning and enhancing their basic water safety skills to reduce the risk of drowning and aquatic-related injuries.





LIFF JACKETS.

When used appropriately, life jackets protect you when you are not expecting to be in the water, especially around natural water. Ensure your life jackets are tested & approved by the U.S. Coast Guard.





EMERGENCY PREPARATION:

Being prepared for an emergency with CPR with rescue breaths and basic water rescue skills can make the difference between life and death. Know the address and be ready to call 911.
